

### **Letter from the NEW Executive Director**

Dear Jamestown supporters,

I never imagined spearheading **new leadership** for Jamestown, as the new Executive Director, would mean immediately rethinking our programs and supporting our community in a **new world** under the pandemic. Upon reflection, I have been so proud of how the Jamestown team has **risen** - adapted, evolved, and thrived - during a very unknown difficult period.

Jamestown was on track for a record breaking year, working with 2,798 students and families. Suddenly, in March 2020 the world and our programs came to a halt -- we weren't able to see our kids in-person. But that did not stop us. The team located our families, found their pressing needs and delivered hundreds of books, laptops, and food while also working remotely with all our youth and families. We provided online supports with distance learning, art, dance, and soccer for all. Our family strengthening programs didn't miss a beat because they began Zoom sessions weeks after shelter in place, and we hosted a virtual Carnaval 2020!

I am so proud of our community's achievements at the peak of COVID, highlighting how Jamestown can be resilient and RISE UP no matter what the world puts in our path. Thank you!

## Jamestown programs RISING UP to meet the needs of our community

Jamestown experienced a year of significant growth in FY19-20 -- here are some highlights of our organization and programs:

- We finalized our second successful year as a merged organization with Loco Bloco -- our board and staff worked collaboratively to provide the best possible programming for our community.
- Together alongside Mission Neighborhood Centers and Mission Economic Development Agency (MEDA), we acquired equity at 701 Alabama, as part of the move into new office space at Mission Language Vocational School (MLVS).
- We began offering Escalera, CASA and CASA Code, a suite of UnidosUS programming to teens
  and middle schoolers. Our partnership with UnidosUS, the largest Latinx advocacy organization
  in the country, has allowed us to expand our capacity and provide more engagement
  opportunities for teens in our community.
- Girls Got Goals, our soccer program for girls, expanded into 5th grade and high school, providing unique athletic, youth development and team building opportunities for more participants!


